Note from the Chair

The kimff team is excited to present a lineup of films that encompass diverse narratives about people, places, culture and mountain sport. Our films cover a wide range of genres from fiction to non-fiction, and styles from cinema verite, adventure cinema, experimental shorts, and light-hearted POV films.

In this edition of kimff, we hope audiences are inspired by individuals and adventurers who have lived life on their own terms in The Great White Whale, Queendom, Into the Heart of the Mountain, Atirkul in the Land of Real Men, From Above you Can See Better- Wanda Rutkiewicz, Climbing for Gold, and Yamnuska: The Ragged Edge. We are moved by the films Dhye Dreams, Against the Tide and No Monastery No Village where the protagonists struggle with the impacts of climate change on their homes and lives. The female protagonists in The Childless Village, Andro Dreams, and Silent Walls make us smile and want to cry at their predicaments.

The 30 films in Nepal Panorama spotlight local talent and stories about contemporary Nepal. The queer protagonists in Yatra and Arkesta inspire us, a passionate dog lover in Wagging Tale moves us while the plight of a returnee migrant worker in Phera, and, of an indigenous community in Bankariya, angers us. We empathise with the dilemma of a childless couple in Dubidha and with a mother and daughter's predicament in Chiso Ghar. We get a glimpse into a child's mind in Hawaman, and, we laugh out loud at the irreverent antics of the protagonists in Nepali Fiction.

Festival highlights include the Asia Premiere of The Tiger's Nest, an international production filmed in Nepal; Everest Revisited 1924-2024, a photo exhibition and film screening of pioneering attempts on Everest; a special screening of



Korean films to celebrate 50 years of Nepal-Korea friendship; a panel on Women Behind the Camera; a Cut.Katha documentary film pitch; an edit lab for fiction and non-fiction filmmakers; Mountains Matter- A Call from the Himalayas, a Storytellers event, and, Make/Film/Learn - a Camera Sika installation and exhibition.

The festival team invites you to the screenings, displays and the critical and creative conversations with participating filmmakers and speakers, and, to meet the jury.

Co-hosted by the Kathmandu Metropolitan City, kimff 2024 includes diverse and compelling stories under the festival tagline 'Echoes of Change'. It also reflects the transition the festival is going through as we strive to stay relevant and engaged with the audience. Regina Bärtschi is a film editor who trained at the School of Design in Bern, Swiss television and New York. She started her filmmaking career as an assistant director on various feature films. Her films have been nominated to various prizes and won several including Golden Globe, Grimme Prize, German Television Award, Audience Choice Award Best Film at St. Louis International Film Festival, Perspektive Deutsches Kino at Berlinale, Best Documentary at the Sao Paolo International Film Festival European TV Festival ZOOM and Barcelona TV Film Festival. Bärtschi has worked in a factory, served as guest lecturer at the Bern University of the Arts and been jury member at the Berlinale Children's Film Festival. Since 2006 she has been a tutor for editing and dramaturgy at the Yangon Film School in Myanmar.

Kimff Edit Lab with Regina Bärtschi

26-28 May | Hotel Tibet, Lazimpat

The Kimff Edit Lab, led by Swiss film editor Regina Bärtschi, offers Nepali filmmakers a unique opportunity to sharpen their films' edges. Filmmakers and editors (fiction & non-fiction) will receive intensive hands-on editing guidance and a chance to refine their works-in-progress, gain valuable insights and network within the Kimff community. Designed with the aim to enable filmmakers to learn from each other's work the three-day Lab will devote time to watch and discuss in depth the participating projects and how best to approach the stories they are trying to tell. The Edit Lab is supported by the Embassy of Switzerland in Kathmandu.

Editing Master Class with Regina Bärtschi

28 May Tuesday | 3:00-5:00 pm | Gehendra Dhimal Foundation, Mandikatar

This special master class for filmmakers and film students will delve into the editing process as Swiss film editor Regina Bärtschi analyses a project, shares valuable insights and techniques to elevate storytelling in films. It will look at the basics of film editing while touching on topics such as techniques for seamless cuts that propel the story forward without a hitch as well as editing scenes with emotion where every edit can heighten the impact of what a character may be feeling. Participants will observe Baertschi deconstruct a project, giving insights into her approach and methodology.

Camera Sika Exhibition Showcase

The Camera Sika programme, launched by the British Council and developed by Into Film, began as a pilot project in Nepal in November 2019. This exhibition highlights the innovative work of Camera Sika, dedicated to empowering young people by helping them discover and develop creative and technical skills through filmmaking. Visitors to this interactive installation can explore galleries, experience a mock studio setup and watch films created by young filmmakers on display screens. The exhibition also offers a range of resources and learning materials, providing an insight into the world of filmmaking. The exhibition will run for five days, from 11:00 am to 4:00 pm, with guided tours available upon request.

Mountains Waste to Crafts by Nepali Women

29 May-2 June | Rastriya Sabha Griha (City Hall) Foyer

For Mountaineers, the climbing rope is a symbol of safety, their lifeline. During expeditions, the lives of mountaineers literally hangs by a thread i.e. a Climbing rope.

Unfortunately, these very ropes are also one of the most common items left in the mountain after expeditions. On top of that, they are one of the most difficult items to recycle.

Under the Nepal Army Led – Mountain Cleanup Campaign 2021 & 22 – one of the largest Mountain Clean up campaigns in the world, these ropes were collected from eight mountains of Nepal, viz., Everest, Lhotse, Makalu, Dhaulagiri, Amadablam, Pumori, Manaslu & kanchanjunga.

The vision of the campaign's official recycling partner, Avni Ventures to not let any of the waste collected from the mountains to go to the landfills, gave birth to the idea of up-cycling them into

beautiful, functional products. These ropes have undergone series of processing by women at Avni Ventures. In partnership with Nepal Knotcraft Centre, the craft-persons and weavers from the indigenous communities of Nepal have coiled the climbing ropes with natural plant fibers to transform them into beautiful products.

Everest Revisited 1924-2024 | Screening and Panel Discussion

29 May Wednesday | 3:00-5:00 pm | Nepal Tourism Board

Everest Revisited 1924-2024 is an Alpine Club production made in association with the Mount Everest Foundation. Using photos taken by the climbers on the expeditions and John Noel's films from the 1920s, the film tells the story of the 1924 expedition focusing on the partnership of George Mallory and Andrew Irvine as well as the contribution of many of the remarkable members including Sherpas and Bhotias. The film also examines what Everest means today to the Nepalis, and to the world. Everest is a place of changing value and impact, some good, some questionable. To reach the highest point on our planet is at once a measure of our ambition and achievement and, at the same time, of our frailties and vanity. Julie Summers, the great-niece of Sandy Irvine and mountaineer and narrator Matt Sharman seek insights in interviews with many well-known climbers including Sir Chris Bonington, Rebecca Stephens, Krish Thapa, Stephen Venables and Leo Houlding. Social and scientific observations are given by Dr. Jonathan Westway, Dr. Melanie Windridge and historian and mountaineer Ed Douglas. One hundred years after the loss of Mallory and Irvine, what have we learnt, what have we gained and what have we lost?

An international panel of mountaineers, historians and authors will hold a discussion on all aspects of the Everest enigma following the screening.

The short film Let's Talk Period by filmmaker Rajin Maharjan tries to break the taboo around menstruation in Nepal with a focus on the supporting role of men/fathers and 'positive masculinity' in general. It features specifically the positive impact of inclusive digital solutions—like the Oky app, period tracker from girls for girls—to empower girls and young women.

The film is part of a campaign that started as a social media campaign #NepalsMenstrualMovement which evolved into a gender-transformative #LetsTalkPERIOD approach implemented in Nepal, Albania, and the Philippines. The campaign has roped in the support Keki Adhikari, Nepali actress, model, film producer and social activist as well as Dayahang Rai, Nepal's best-known actor, to make more and more boys and men involved of this discussion on menstrual health and hygiene and highlight challenges and solutions for girls and women in Nepal.

A selected group will then make their revised pitches to a live audience at Kimff 2024. 3 winners will receive a grant to produce their films.

The fierce competition between the two men vying for Shams's love, is outed by the jealous crook Abdelkader in front of the entire village. Now, accused of being an instrument of the devil, rejected by Habib who feels betrayed, Shams is forced to leave the village to start a new life. But little did Shams know that this journey would be filled with more sorrow and rejection.



Nada Mezni Hafaiedh, born in Saudi Arabia, was exposed to different cultures from an early age, including Saudi Arabia, USA, France and Canada, due to her diplomat parents. At the age of ten she was making films and video clips casting her friends and family as actors. She went to Montreal to study Business Administration, but soon changed her course to follow her passion for filmmaking. After graduating from the School of Cinema in Montreal, she opened her production company making films in Canada. She is known for tearing down taboo, and touching on fundamental issues that are related to freedom. On her return to her country of origin, Tunisia, in 2009, she made Hekayat Tounisia (Tunisians Stories). The film was screened at several festivals and received awards. Atirkul in the Land of Real Men



65 min | France/ Kyrgyzstan | 2023

On the vast plains of Kyrgyzstan, men continue to practise buzkashi, a team sport that has been popular in Central Asia for centuries. The aim of the game is to steal the trophy of a dead goat from the rival team of riders while remaining on horseback. We watch players gallop across the plains against a backdrop of snow-capped mountains and blue skies, jumping on each other like rugby players to grab the goat carcass and take it across the goal line. Into this tough masculine world enters Atirkül, a woman with an enterprising spirit and a sense of humour. Tired of her husband being away from home all the time, she decides to get involved in horse trading. The film portrays the everyday life of this headstrong horse enthusiast and business woman, whose ambition is to find local young men to form her own buzkashi team and in this way preserve the heritage of her native region and gradually reveal the possibilities of overcoming gender roles.

Born in Kyrgyzstan, Juspujan studied literature in Almaty. She worked as a journalist at Radio Free Europe's Kyrgyz Department for 20 years and was the artistic director of the One World Festival of Documentary Films on Human Rights, Kyrgyzstan. Into the Heart of the Mountain

97 min | Netherlands/ Nepal | 2023

At one level, Into the Heart of the Mountain follows clinicians of Nomads Clinic on its annual medical pilgrimage, which has been undertaken for four decades, to Humla in northwestern Nepal, as they follow trails and cross passes of more than 18.000 feet with spectacular mountains in the background. It documents their efforts to bring urgent medical care to the people of this secluded mountain region, home to the spiritual, pre-Buddhist, Bon culture. At another level the film portrays a people who so far have managed to preserve their social, cultural, economic and political integrity. But climate change together with their struggle for rights to their ancestral, nomadic lands and natural resources are undermining the very fabric of their existence. The film is also the story of Zen Buddhist spiritual leader Roshi Joan Halifax, who created Nomads Clinic and is the narrator of the documentary, as she grapples with the layers of deception and of gender-based violence as well as pervasive misogyny that have shaped her life.





Annegré Bosman is a Dutch documentary filmmaker and photojournalist. She studied Journalism at the University of Applied Sciences, Utrecht and screenwriting in Amsterdam. Since then she has dedicated herself to bringing new perspectives and deeper public understanding to topics around human rights with a special focus on women's rights, gender equality, indigenous cultures, climate change and nature and wildlife conservation. Her works include Baby's World: The Life of the Newborn, Can Hunting be Conservation? the documentary series Out of Jail, At Work and the short documentary This Could Have Happened to Me, which was screened at IDFA, and Wildlife Savers, Unsung Heroes, which won the Conservation Award at Wildlife Film Festival Rotterdam, among others. Bosman is founder of the By Nature Films Foundation. Filmmaking has taken her to dramatic peaks of Nepal, the deserts of South Sudan and Indonesian rainforests.

(Todesfalle Haute Route- Rekonstruktion eines Dramas) Death Trap Haute Route – Reconstruction of a Tragedy

90 min | Switzerland/ Austria/ France/ Italy | 2023

Seven people froze to death from exhaustion in snow and ice, only 550 meters from the hut that would have saved them. The ski touring drama on the Haute Route of April 29, 2018, leaves many questions unanswered. The drama under the Pigne d'Arolla, on the legendary Haute Route, the ski tour between Chamonix and Zermatt, is the biggest accident of its kind in the Swiss Alps. Based on the survivors' testimonies, documents and photos, re-enacted scenes, as well as GPS data and excerpts from the investigation report of the public prosecutor's office in Sion, the film reconstructs the dramatic events of this tour and tries to find answers. Death Trap Haute Rout – Reconstruction of a Tragedy also shows that despite the supposed safety of modern tools and equipment, helicopter rescue and the proximity to civilisation, nature is stronger than man. It casts light on what is happening in the Alps, where mountain tourism is very much on the increase.

Frank Senn, born in 1963, is an award-winning documentary film producer working for the documentary department of Swiss National Television. He specialises in outdoor and climbing films all over the world. In 1995, he completed Death on the Dhaulagiri, his first documentary film about a fatal mountain-climbing expedition in the Himalayas. This was followed by several other films. Senn co-produced Eiger—Live in 1999 which followed four mountaineers live on their seventeen-hour ascent to the Eiger summit and received many awards. In 2002, he and Thomas Ulrich made the documentary Eiger North Face – On the Tracks of the First Climbers which won several awards including at festivals like BANFF and Graz. He also produced, together with Hari Thapa from Nepal, after five years of preparation, the film Sherpas – The True Heroes of Mount Everest which won awards at festivals all over the world including at KIMFF. In 2016 and 2017 he covered in two films the tragedy of the earthquake in Nepal with the titles In the Shadows of Everest.





Kazuya Hiraide, three times Piolets d'Or winner by conquering unclimbed routes of Kamet, Shispare and Rakaposhi, discovered the ideal climbing route on the north face of Tirich Mir (7708m) 20 years ago. Since then, he has had eyes on Tirich Mir until the right time came. Though some teams have climbed the mountain since its first ascent by a Norwegian expedition in 1950, none of them challenged the north face because it's very difficult even to get to the base of it. In late 2022, Hiraide asked the younger and less experienced Kenro Nakajima, who has been his climbing partner since 2016, to climb the route with him. Nakajima is uncertain whether he is good enough to be a 'real' partner of Hiraide for the climb. The two climbers leave base camp to climb Tirich Mir without oxygen or big support. They have absolutely no idea what kind of danger they face as there are no photos or information of the route. After many struggles of six days and nights, the two reach the summit of Tirich Mir. Nakajima feels his growth physically and technically. Tears fall from his eyes.

She has created over 30 documentary films mostly for commercial TV station and NHK, the public TV in Japan. Dancing in Fire: Khalikhane Fire-Walking and Ritual Healing in the Kathmandu Valley of Nepal

47 min | Nepal | 2023

This film documents, for the first time, spirit and deity possession seances and the sacred Khalikhane fire-walking ceremony in a Hindu village in Kathmandu Valley. It is an audio-visual sensory and multi-storied exploration of experiences and responses to traumatic loss and suffering, and the transformative effects of communal ceremony and ritual healing. Produced over six weeks of continuous filming it captures the immersive rituals, music and dance of the Khalikhane ceremony and the embodied possession testimonies of ancestral spirits who describe their unnatural, often violent, deaths that have left them trapped as wandering spirits. Seeking recognition and release from their earthly existence, they cause family members illness and misfortune. A ritual specialist calls these spirits to possess family members, describe the events of their death and enter the fire-walking ceremony to be released to the divine ancestral realm.

Ramesh Khadka focuses on ethnographic filmmaking and his films have been shown at numerous international films and also won awards. 



No Monastery No Village

High in the Himalaya lies Halzi, a village nestled in the shadow of a glacial lake. It is home to the ancient Halzi Rinchenling Monastery, a cornerstone of the Limi community's cultural heritage for centuries, Halzi faces a growing threat: Glacial Lake Outburst Floods (GLOFs). The documentary explores the plight of the villagers caught between their deep devotion to their heritage and the very real danger of impending floods. Sonam Dhondup, a monk at the monastery, wrestles with the fear of losing the sacred building to the next GLOF. Pema Dolma, a yak herder who lost her herd in a previous avalanche, remains resolute in her devotion to the monastery, despite the hardships. Through their contrasting viewpoints, the No Monastery No Village sheds light on the complex realities the Limi community faces. It is a poignant exploration of faith, resilience and the fight to preserve a way of life in the face of climate change.

Tashi Lhazom is a prominent youth climate advocate working at the intersection of climate action, gender equality, indigenous rights and political literacy. She has spoken at grassroots, national and global platforms, and is a co-founder of two civil society initiatives. With the many hats that Tashi wears, she is also a filmmaker harnessing the power of storytelling to promote generational change in delivering climate justice. No Monastery, No Village is her directorial debut and is of her homeland, the Limi valley. She holds an undergraduate degree from Hindu College, University of Delhi.
